Shining Christ's light on Tower Hill since AD675

Welcome to All Hallows by the Tower, the oldest church in the City of London and a living and inclusive church serving today's City community.

All Hallows has been the church for the London Marathon for many years, offering a sign of hope for runners reaching mile 23, and there have been a number of marathoners in the staff team and congregation – including our Lay Minister and former Vicar.

The church is open throughout the week and provides a quiet space for prayer and reflection in the midst of the busyness surrounding us. All are welcome all to join our worship, and our Sunday services in church and on Zoom bring together people from all over London and, often, from across the world.

The Saxon Abbey of Barking founded the church in 675, and an arch from the original building remains. Beneath the arch is a Roman pavement, discovered in 1926, evidence of city life on this site for the best part of two thousand years.

Situated next to the Tower of London, the church has dealt with numerous beheaded bodies, including those of Thomas More, John Fisher and Archbishop Laud. William Penn, founder of Pennsylvania, was baptised and later educated in the church. John Quincy Adams, sixth president of the USA, was married in All Hallows in 1797.

In 1666 the Great Fire of London started in Pudding Lane, a few hundred yards from the church. All Hallows survived through the efforts of Admiral Penn, William Penn's father. In 1940 Hitler's bombs devastated the church; only the tower and the walls remained standing. The late Queen Mother laid a new foundation stone in 1948, and she attended the re-dedication service some nine years later. The vicar at the time was Tubby Clayton, founder of Toc H.

All Hallows has an international ministry through its strong relationship with the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf, of which it is the London home, and with the Church of the Epiphany, New York. It is also the church for HMRC, and has connections to several of the City's Livery Companies.

Second Reading - 2 Corinthians 4.7-18 read by Dawn Austwick, Trustee, The London Marathon Charitable Trust

We have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you.

But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture - 'I believed, and so I spoke' - we also believe, and so we speak, because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.
